Lady Macbeth as a strong female character goes against patriarchal rule.	Killing a King goes against The Divine Rights of Kings, which is the belief that God ordained who should be on the throne, so this makes Macbeth treasonous in the eyes of God. He is also not the correct ruler of the crown. King James 1st as the Scottish King and this being the Scottish play also links. King James the 1st was worried about treason and being killed on the throne as he knew his position was tenuous due to his Scottish heritage and the fact that his predecessor had chosen him.
